Structure, governance and management

Governing Document

The Church is administered in accordance with the Unitary Constitution of the Church of Scotland.

Recruitment and appointment of Trustees

Members of the Kirk Session are the charity trustees. The Kirk Session members are the elders of the Church and are chosen from those members of the Church who are considered to have the appropriate gifts and skills.

Organisational structure

The Kirk Session is responsible for spiritual affairs within the Church. It is represented at Presbytery by an elected elder. Day to day affairs are looked after by various Teams which report regularly to Kirk Session.

The Congregational Roll at 31st December 2022 stood at 441 members (2021: 457).

Objectives

The Church of Scotland is Trinitarian in doctrine, Reformed in tradition and Presbyterian in polity. It exists to glorify God and to work for the advancement of Christ's Kingdom throughout the world. As a national church, it acknowledges a distinctive call and duty to bring the ordinances of religion to the people in every parish of Scotland through a territorial ministry. It co-operates with other churches in various ecumenical bodies in Scotland and beyond.

The Kirk Session is keen to try to encourage young people to become involved in the work and worship of the Church through Sunday Club, Messy Church sessions, Youth Club and social activities.

Activities, achievements and performance

Morning worship takes place each Sunday at 11am and over the course of the year an increasing number of the congregation returned to in-person worship after COVID. The service continues to be live-streamed on YouTube and Facebook and there are regular participants on this platform too. The AV Team work hard to make the broadcasts the best quality possible.

The minister is pleased to be able to visit the local schools again after COVID and has also invited individual groups to visit at the church.

The Kirk Session is back to meeting in-person every two months. Some Teams have become less formalised and a new structure of reporting is being introduced.

The Charity Shop continues to be well supported by people from the community and beyond with good quality donations being received and customers happy to come along and find a bargain. The shop opened in June of 2014 and since then the total figure of grant awards to local good causes topped £100,000 over the course of this year which was a source of satisfaction to volunteers and Kirk Session alike.

Members of the congregation, community and friends from further afield continue to knit and sew garments and toys for the babies at the Joyful Motherhood Project in Malawi and regular updates from the staff there tell how appreciative they are of the support.

Activities, achievements and performance (continued)

The Parish Pantries, which were set up in October 2020, have been used by many in the communities and money from the charity shop enabled new, more substantial, storage units to be set up in Kincardine O'Neil, Lumphanan and Torphins. The Reverse Advent Calendar, whereby people buy an item for the pantry each day in December, generated a good supply of food to keep the pantries topped up over the winter months.

A fundraising event for Ukraine was held just after the outbreak of the invasion. There were still various COVID regulations in place so this took the form of a take-away hot dog supper and was well supported by the congregation and community. In May a further fundraiser in the form of a silent auction drew the community together again to raise further funds to support those affected by the ongoing hostilities as well as Charlie House.

We were pleased to host a concert in April by Christian singer/songwriter Gareth Davies Jones and his daughter, Bronwen, which was much enjoyed by all those present.

The Guild was pleased to be able to meet in person again from October and get back to sharing a cup of tea afterwards. They had a variety of interesting speakers including Alisa, a refugee from Ukraine, who explained what life was like when the bombing started and the homes in her street were turned to rubble.

Members of the Garden Gang got back to working together on a Tuesday morning keeping the church grounds tidy and making a pleasant place to walk or sit on our outside benches. The apple and plum trees planted by the children several years ago produced an excellent crop this autumn.

The Rev Smith was an online Commissioner at the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland which took place in hybrid form in 2022.

Sunday Club, which meets during morning worship, has grown in numbers this year and the Youth Worker and her team of volunteers work hard to make the lessons interesting and age appropriate. The young people once again led the Christmas Nativity Service by telling their version of the story in word and song.

We held Messy Church afternoons in March, May and October and these were well attended by members of Sunday Club and families from the community.

In October a monthly Youth Club began on a Friday evening for young people from P3 upwards. Initially everyone attended for two hours but the numbers are such that now the primary aged children come for the first hour and the older ones come for the second. There are table games, colouring projects, Lego, table tennis, darts team games and video dancing challenges as well as a time for a Christian video and message.

In the aftermath of the devastating storms and subsequent power outages of last winter a community emergency response team was set up in Torphins and the Kirk Session agreed that, in the current absence of suitable electrical cabling at the village hall, an emergency generator could be situated at the church so that it can be used as a refuge centre if similar situations occur in the future.

Activities, achievements and performance (continued)

The Christmas Tree Festival returned in December after a gap of two years and we welcomed visitors over the weekend before Christmas. We worked together with the local Tractor Run to have them bring the tractors to the car park and for local crafters to have stalls in the hall on the Saturday night which was very successful. Donations taken at the Christmas Tree Festival and the Christmas Eve services were shared between the Forget-me-not Club in Banchory and Christian Aid.

Financial review

Presentation of accounts

The Accounts include only those funds held locally by the congregation. Those funds held by the General Trustees at the Church of Scotland in Edinburgh are shown in the Appendix. Legal titles for all church properties are also held by the General Trustees.

General Fund

The General Fund is an 'unrestricted' fund and is used for running most of the congregation's activities. This financial review will focus mainly on the receipts and payments flowing through this fund.

General Fund - income

The principal source of income for the Church is the 'giving' from members of the congregation (and tax reclaims thereon from the government). Overall, during 2022 giving through the General Fund totalled £60,410 which was slightly higher than the previous year (2021: £59,635). While this stability is encouraging, total giving is still circa 5-7% lower than pre-covid levels.

Within the total for giving in 2022, the 'open plate/digital giving' was up 111% (2021: down 16%) to £2,824, 'Free Will Offering envelopes' giving were up 4% (2021: up 6%) to £3,182 and other giving and bank standing orders were down 6% (2021: down 2%) at £40,574. The Gift Aid tax reclaimed from the government generated £12,071 in 2022 (2021: £12,270) which was a 2% lower (2021: up 9%).

Total rental related income increased by 64% to £10,850 in 2022 (2021: £6,603) but this is still lower than the pre pandemic annual level of circa £12,000. Charges made for weddings and funerals in 2022 totalled £1,100 (2021: £1,050); income from letting out Lumphanan Hall was £200 higher at £241 and income from letting out the rooms in the church buildings was £2,894 higher at £4,232. Income from letting out Ha'berry to Torphins Playgroup was £807 higher at £5,177 including £2,380 of recharged electricity costs (2021: £4,370 including £1,491 electricity charges).

General Fund - expenses

The congregation's largest ongoing cost is the gross allocation made to the central Church of Scotland's Ministries and Mission Fund which totalled £43,045 in 2022 (2021: £38,433). This cost is before deducting endowment income of £11,706 (2021: £5,557), which rose due mainly to the higher interest environment.

This gross allocation covers the payroll and pension costs of ministers in the Church of Scotland (including our own) together with a contribution towards the wider work of the Church. Up until 2022 the gross allocation was calculated by the central church based on a rolling three-year average of each congregation's general income. New 'Giving to Grow' regulations are being adopted for 2023 onwards.

Our part time Youth Worker was paid a salary through the General Fund of £4,804 in 2022 (2021: £2,135). The congregation paid fees to organists (including the Youth Worker) of £2,452 in 2022 (2021: £2,228) and the cleaner was paid £2,899 (2021: £2,704).

The total cost of heating and lighting all our buildings in 2022 rose by £1,765 or 34% to £6,906 (2021: £5,141). Electricity costs rose by only 15% in the year due to price fixing and there were helpful rebates from storm Arwen. Heating oil costs, however, rose by £1,512 in the year mainly because the cost per litre of kerosene rose by an average of 63% over 2021. A similar quantity of kerosene (in litres) was ordered for the church and meeting rooms in 2022 compared to 2021.

Financial review (continued) General Fund (continued)

The cost of council tax, water rates and sewerage costs for church buildings were higher at £3,410 in 2022 (2021: £3,311). Charges in the extension relating to broadband, telephone and toilet hygiene services rose by 31% to £1,008 in 2022 (2021: £770) largely due to the timing of payments. A total of £4,158 (2021: £4,070) was spent on insurances.

Church buildings, equipment and grounds

In 2022 work continued on improving and maintaining the congregation's facilities. The largest item of expenditure was purchasing and installing a multi-fuel stove in the New Manse (£5,587) followed by the payment of the deposit to refurbish the pipe organ in the church sanctuary (£2,592).

General Fund – (deficit)/surplus

Before any transfers from other funds and before accounting for third party fundraising, there was a deficit on the General Fund of £1,823 (2021: £1,369 surplus, 2020: £3,086 deficit).

The proportion of operating expenses that is covered by congregational giving in 2022 was 82.3% (2021: 78.0%). The Trustees aim has been to move this stewardship performance indicator closer towards 100% through stewardship programs and by careful control over costs. In the table below, the 114.7% indicator was unusually strong in 2018 because of the lower operating expenses in a time of ministerial vacancy. This indicator dropped back in 2020 and 2021 largely due to the exceptional circumstances resulting from the COVID-19 pandemic, but this has recovered a little in 2022.

General Fund - reserves policy

It is the Trustees' intention to hold liquid reserves of around 6-9 months' expenditure in its General Fund at any time using a rolling five year average – i.e. between £35,000 and £50,000 approximately. At 31st December 2022, the Church held £61,065 (2021: £62,201) in its General Fund (see Note 8). While this balance in the General Fund is strong, the Trustees are aware of the continuing need to avoid large financial deficits and maintain general reserves in order to meet unexpected items of expenditure. The Kirk Session has plans for using part of the strong balance in the General Fund to finance church growth and increase reserves for future large expenditure on fabric such as improving energy efficiency.

At 31st December 2022, Mid Deeside Church held locally funds (including the General Fund referred to above) with a total of £168,780 (2021: £170,991) which have been provided for the purposes explained in Note 2. A breakdown of these balances can be found in Note 8.

Financial review (continued)

Investment policy and performance

It is the Trustees' policy to hold most of its funds in bank and deposit accounts in order to have sufficient liquidity to meet short term emergencies and commitments to contractors. The balance of the Church's capital resources is currently held in the Income Fund administered by the Church of Scotland Investors Trust.

Statement of Trustees' responsibilities

The members of the Kirk Session must prepare financial statements which give sufficient detail to enable an appreciation of the transactions of the Church during the financial year. The members of the Kirk Session are responsible for keeping proper accounting records which, on request, must reflect the financial position of the Church at that time.

This must be done to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005, the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006 and the Regulations Anent Congregational Finance approved by the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland in 2007. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the Church and must take reasonable steps for the prevention and/or detection of fraud and other irregularities

Independent Examiner's Report to the Trustees of Mid Deeside Parish Church of Scotland

I report on the accounts of the charity for the year ended 31st December 2022 which are set out on pages 11 to 20.

Respective responsibilities of Trustees and Examiner

The charity's Trustees are responsible for the preparation of the accounts in accordance with the terms of the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005 and the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006.

The charity Trustees consider that the audit requirement of Regulation 10(1) (d) of the Accounts Regulations does not apply. It is my responsibility to examine the accounts as required under section 44(1) (c) of the Act and to state whether particular matters have come to my attention.

Basis of independent examiner's statement

My examination is carried out in accordance with Regulation 11 of the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006. An examination includes a review of the accounting records kept by the charity and a comparison of the accounts presented with those records. It also includes consideration of any unusual items or disclosures in the accounts and seeks explanations from the Trustees concerning any such matters. The procedures undertaken do not provide all the evidence that would be required in an audit, and consequently I do not express an audit opinion on the view given by the accounts.

1. Trustee remuneration and related party transactions

During the year six (2021: five) Trustees received reimbursement for day to day church expenses, equipment purchases and other costs incurred on behalf of the congregation totalling £2,717 (2021 £5,149). In 2022 one Trustee received fees for carrying out beadle duties at funerals (2021: two).

Rev. Holly Smith received reimbursement of £1,180 (2021: £1,200) for travel expenses (paid through the central Church of Scotland offices) and reimbursement of £470 (2021: £529) for the rental and working cost of the manse telephone and a subscription to Zoom used for church meetings. Rev. Smith was also reimbursed a total of £1,134 (2021: £1,125) for the cost of other ministry and manse expenses.

Purposes of Designated or Restricted funds

(a) Funds held locally:

General Fund: for the day-to-day income and expenses of church life.

Fabric Fund: for the upkeep, maintenance and replacement of fabric and equipment of church properties.

Development Fund: for initiatives which support youth, families and the elderly.

The Guild: The aim of the Guild is to invite and encourage men and women to commit their lives to Jesus Christ and to enable them to express their faith in worship, prayer and action.

Fair Trade Stall (World Church): for initiatives which support mothers with young children, farmers and producers in less developed countries.

Charity Shop: This activity supports the church and causes within the Parish.

Extension Project Fund: for the sanctuary refurbishment, extension and improvements.

Organ Restoration Fund: for the restoration and ongoing maintenance of the pipe organ.

Children's Christian Education Fund: for supporting the work of young people's groups.

Spark Clock Fund: for the maintenance of the clock in the tower of the former Lumphanan sanctuary of Mid Deeside Church.

Benevolent Fund: for the Minister to make discretionary and confidential grants to those in real need within the Parish.

(b) Funds held by the General Trustees in Edinburgh:

Miss J Spark Fund: This fund is to be used for the upkeep, maintenance and replacement of fabric and equipment of church properties.

G Spark Fund: This fund is to be used for the upkeep, maintenance and replacement of fabric and equipment of church properties.

3. Accounting policies

The accounts are prepared on a cash basis. This means that only income received and expenditure incurred in the financial year is included in these accounts.

Normal repairs and maintenance to the fabric of the buildings are charged against the General Fund and the Fabric Fund. Exceptional and significant repairs and/or improvements are met from the Development Fund, Extension Project Fund or by special fundraising efforts. The Charity Shop activities generate funding for fabric repairs, maintenance and improvements relating to the Charity Shop.
